




Migouri, Kenya

Send a Cow is working in western Kenya where climate change is one of the biggest challenges, and farming families are struggling to grow enough to eat. With increasingly high temperatures and erratic rainfall, the effects of climate change are already increasing hunger and poverty.

Those who have contributed the least to the problem are suffering the most.

The challenges facing Migouri





Many families experience 4-5 hunger months each year



Due to erratic rainfall, 70% of families have to collect their water



25% of households are headed by widows, many are living with HIV/AIDs



46% of the population live below the poverty line

Caren's story



Caren is widowed and lives in western Kenya with her three grandchildren. For many years, she struggled to provide enough food to feed her family. To add to her burden, she was diagnosed with HIV/AIDs which meant that she was trying to work whilst feeling extremely ill. Erratic rainfall often caused her crops to fail, leaving the family with little to eat. Life was merely about survival.

Today, she is leading a very different life and looks to the future with great hope. When Caren started working with Send a Cow she received training in organic farming, water harvesting, healthcare and business skills. With newfound knowledge and confidence, she transformed her land by growing bananas and a range of vegetables providing her family with a healthy diet.

Before long, she started selling surplus vegetables, providing a vital income. She also learnt how to harvest rain water to irrigate her crops during drier periods.

"Life has really changed. I eat a balanced diet, and although I am HIV positive, I lead a healthy life. People come to ask me how I manage, and I help others to talk about it. Send a Cow training has made us strong! My children are going to school. I no longer have to beg. I now 'pass-on' knowledge and seeds to others." - Caren

"In my work, I witness families going from barely eating a meal a day to producing adequate food; from owning almost nothing to acquiring land and livestock," she says. "I feel fulfilled that my work

is in alignment with the purposes of God, who created us to reinforce dignity and serve other people. My Christian values drive and motivate me to serve the families on this project."

Our approach



Send a Cow is working with 4,500 families in Migouri to address their challenges. This number includes approximately 200 widows and 600 orphans, the most marginalised of their community. Over a four-year project, the families will receive vital training and support so that they can make the most of their land - and lift themselves out of poverty for good. In this project we'll focus on helping families to...



Grow nutritious food

- We'll equip families with seeds, training and tools so they can farm their land effectively, grow nutritious food in the face of climate change and tackle hunger.
- We'll train families in organic farming techniques, so they can improve the quality of their soil and grow crops to eat and sell.



Access clean water

- We'll work with communities to restore and create new water sources so that the whole community can benefit from safe, clean water.
- We'll train families how to harvest rainwater so they can irrigate their crops during the dry spells and provide food for their families despite erratic rainfall



Work together for the greater good

- Through gender equality training, we'll support husbands and wives to work together, rebalancing the workloads and giving women a greater say over how money is spent.
- We'll work with the community to provide education about HIV/AIDs



Develop business skills

 We'll provide families with the information about how to access savings and credits services. With this knowledge, they can make informed choices on how they want to invest their savings and stay out of poverty.
